Our present programs need people to serve on the various Committees. Please join us and help make these goals a reality. Call and offer to be, not only a member, but an ACTIVE participant, too.



Harrison House Museum

Why should the Branford Historical Society maintain and seek to improve our one-room museum at the Harrison House?

As Branford residents, we live within one day commuting distance of some of the greatest museums in the world-New York, Boston, Hartford, New Haven. While there are numerous special interest small museums in New England, visitors to the Harrison House are primarily interested in local history. They want details on the house, and the people who occupied it. They have questions on the Indians who occupied the territory before the English came, and the circumstances of the settlement at Branford (Totoket). They are interested in how the original settlers, and those who followed, met the challenge of the environment and

developed a pattern of living within that environment.

Historical facts and photographs are available from many sources—the Blackstone Library, church records, town hall, our archives and our Town Historian, Jane Bouley. But the ability to see actual, genuine objects is fundamental in the consideration of museums.

Alta Powelson has just completed a thorough inventory of all objects in our collections at the Harrison House and has updated all of our records accordingly—a long and tedious job well done.

We are pleased to present our own Town Historian, Jane Bouley, with a new lecture titled "Along The Branford River, In Time and Place." It will be held in the renovated Blackstone Library auditorium. Come at 7:30 p.m. for cider and donuts and socializing; the lecture begins at 8:00 p.m. We particularly welcome members of the Branford Land Trust who have been working on the cleanup and study of the Branford River.

December 6, Sunday 1-5 p.m. Once more the 17th century House will be aglow with festive decorations and candlelight for the annual open house, welcoming members and guests with punch, refreshments, music, and hospitality. It is a lovely time to visit with each other and to see the old House at its best.

We are pleased to introduce our new Program Chairman, Judy Myjak, who will be coordinating the Spring program. Judy is an RTM member and active volunteer, who is interested in the Historical Society, and willing to take a position of responsibility. We are planning to have monthly meetings from February through May, and members are welcome to attend!

the museum. Frankly, our position at this point reminds me of an old joke that a museum is a large group of labels illustrated by a small group of specimens. Our donations in recent years have consisted largely of documents and photographs which are most welcome but better suited to library and archive development.

This year I have tried to create a more professional look to our museum displays. There are some permanent displays on the Harrison House and the Academy on the Green which have been expanded., Our new displays include our mannequin dressed in a suit worn by Deacon Ralph Linsley of Northford at his baptism in 1790, and a small collection of antique cobalt-blue Staffordshire tableware. I have also presented an unusual stoneware trophy awarded as first prize to Clara F. Corey in the Killams Point tennis tournament of 1898. A 300-year-old watchman's rattle is also there for viewing for the first time. In addition, Arnold Peterson has added "fire" (little lights) to the fire places in the House model which he built and donated to the Historical Society.

Other members of the Historical Society have donated their talents to the museum. Betty Mount, using her book-binding expertise, repaired a writing portfolio belonging to the first principal at the Academy on the Green. Arnold Peterson has agreed to become our Museum consultant on displays. He constructed a support table for the House model, as well as seven hanging mounting panels for display. These panels will eliminate the need to damage the fragile plaster walls with nails. Bill Hendricks has constructed cradles for our telescopes, a holding device for our mannequin and various support devices for displays.

I have tried to give you a picture of our Museum to date. We need membership assistance with donations or loans of any **objects** with ties to Branford history. A little story or history on the subject would be welcome. I am planning for next year's displays and welcome calls at 488-7411.

The Harrison House Museum is open from 2:00 - 5:00 p.m., Thursday through Sunday until October 1. Knowledgeable guides are on hand to answer any questions. For more information, please call 488-4828.
