## Jane Bouley's FOCUS ON BRANFORD - continued

During its first two centuries Branford was essentially a farming community, but some attempts at manufacturing were made. The first of significance was an iron works on the shore of The Great Lake, later known as Furnace Pond and now Lake Salstonstall.

The first iron works and blast furnace in Connecticut was started in 1655 on this lake and continued operations about 25 years. Its principal owners were Stephen Goodyear and John Winthrop of New Haven. Before this time metal items had to be imported from England and were very expensive. The furnace was supplied with bog-ore from North Haven which probably was brought down by water. Branford supplied about a third of the wood and lime, New Haven the rest. Jasper Crane was Branford's agent to the Iron Works.

The operation was not without problems. After Winthrop left to become Connecticut's governor controversies arose. The work was very hazardous; conduct of workers in the town was cause for complaints. In 1679 a foreman was killed at the site and there was difficulty getting workmen due to an epidemic at that time. The Iron Works was sold in 1680 and operation ceased.

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### STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL - JUNE 1989

"At times they were on line thirty and forty deep," said LIZ RADULSKI, chairperson for this past June's Strawberry Festival, "and it was a struggle to keep the whipped cream coming fast enough."

With over 70 volunteers working on some aspect of the festival the struggle proved a grand success. Over 1200 shortcakes were served netting a profit of more than \$2000.

"The combination of advance ticket purchases by the Society's membership and our willing crew of volunteers made this possible," Liz continued. "And a special word of thanks goes to those who headed several task groups and gave extra time and effort: Jane Bouley, Janet Gaines, Peg Hampton, Bill Johnston, Alice Lambert, Tootsie Laske, Betty Linsley, Jeanne Szeifert, and Michael Sykes."

When submitting her report to the board, Liz took pains to emphasize that if it is planned to continue sponsorship of the Strawberry Festival, whether independently or in conjunction with the Branford Festival, we are faced with increasing costs. "To assure a worthwhile profit we'll need two things," she said. "More ticket purchases by increasing numbers of Society members and a larger pool of volunteers to help in myriad capacities. We need to find new talent willing and able to help lighten the load carried by those who now give so many hours in support of our activities."

Board members and officers have yet to discuss Strawberry Festival plans for 1990, but they had to agree with Liz Radulski's advice about a larger volunteer work force and increased ticket sales.

On the "home field" this group of Society members assembled the season's exhibit in the Memorabilia Room (Hall chamber) on the theme "Textiles & More" using many items acquired in recent years and all having a connection with Branford. Dismantling is planned following the December 3d Christmas party.

"Away from home," on July 13, several accessions group members spent an enjoyable day viewing the special 350th birthday exhibit held at both the Fairfield Historical Society and the Fairfield Library. 36 locally-made quilts dating from the mid-1770s to the present plus quilted clothing and antique fabrics were shown.

In recent months the Society has been fortunate to acquire a sizable treasure of photos, documents, newsclips and other materials from the Arthur Seaburg estate relating to Branford. These include several thousand slides taken by Art throughout the community beginning in 1951, plus uncounted MIF pictures & related items, and dozens of other photographs and Branford memorabilia/collectibles. We are grateful to members of the Seaburg family and their friends for making this possible.

It follows, of course, that we are contemplating an exhibit on the Malleable Iron Foundry for next year based upon a great portion of this collection.
