## ARCHIVAL ACQUISITIONS

Much material on the Montowese House has been received from Lydia Noble Booth. Sheldon House Memorabilia has been donated by Louis Lavassa. Elizabeth Bradley Tucker has brought in deeds to oyster grounds off Stony Creek and the discharge papers of Henry Johnson. From Eleanor Hammer Scherer we have received family photos, a large Tole tray and some homespun sheets.

### BRANFORD: AS IT BEGAN....

Land along the river between New Haven and Guilford was occupied by the Wanjunk tribe of Mattabeseck (Middletown), part of the Quinnipiac Tribe. There were only a few families here led by Montowese, son of the Sachem, Sowheog. They came in the summer to "Totoket" as they called it to live off the land and the sea and returned north in the winter. The Indian occupation is evidenced by the finding of numerous projectile points and oyster dumps in Branford through the years.

In 1638 the New Haven Colony in several purchases acquired Totoket from Momauguin, Montowese and Sowheog which included land north to the present day Wallingford. An

attempt to settle Totoket was made by Samuel Eaton, brother of Governor Theophilus Eaton of New Haven, which proved unsuccessful.

In 1644 there was dissatisfaction with the ministry at Wethersfield and a group from that town settled in Branford. They were joined by a number of families from New Haven and the difficult task of building homes and cutting trails began.
