

History of Branford
(cont. from previous newsletter)

(Branford Historical Society Vice President Jane Bouley was appointed to the post of Town Historian by the Branford Board of Selectmen in March '88. Congratulations!)

The settlement of Branford progressed after its founding until 1665 when a threat to its existence occurred. Branford was a part of the New Haven Colony which was separate from the Connecticut Colony. The New Haven Colony enforced much stricter Puritan rules governing the rights of church and non-church members. In 1664 the New Haven Colony was terminated and absorbed into the Connecticut Colony with its much more lenient views.

A large faction of the Branford settlers, under the leadership of Branford's minister Rev. Abraham Pierson, felt they could not live with the new government. Twenty-three men signed an agreement to go with Rev. Pierson to begin a new settlement now known as Newark, New Jersey. The group was also joined by residents of Milford, New Haven and Long Island. So in 1665, Branford was left with only half of its population and no doubt there was a struggle to survive. In 1667 those that remained in Branford, joined by some new settlers numbering 47 in all, signed the New Plantation Covenant, pledging their support and dedication to the town of Branford.

The Branford Historical Society's research collections are an important resource to all of us concerned with Branford's history and the preservation of Branford's architectural heritage. Thanks to the efforts of Jane Bouley, Janet Gaines and others, countless old postcards, historical photographs and maps, as well as the town's recent historical resources inventory, have been made easily accessible for public reference in the library at the Harrison House. While many members are familiar with our collections, it is surprising to learn how little they are used.

It is really worth making the effort to view them, especially if you are trying to understand what Branford used to look like or if you are involved with the restoration of one of Branford's many fine buildings. Old photographs and images help us understand the changes made to a building over time and can assist us in planning a building's restoration. Recently, for example, the Branford Center Revitalization Review Board has been studying our photograph collections in order to assist property owners in the development of historically accurate rehabilitation plans.
