# NOTES FROM PRESIDENT BILL JOHNSTON

This year we have planned some maintenance projects for the Harrison House, which include a new gutter on the rear of the house, structural repairs to the front entry door and rear chimney post. The front of the house will also be painted. These repairs need to be carried out to protect the house from our ever changing New England weather.

The front door repair will also include changing the swing from right to left, as it was hung when the house was constructed.

For storage of our extensive photo and document archives, we have created more space. By remodeling the south wall of the kitchen, we can store the 100 or so boxes of the collection. By removing existing cabinets and investing in smaller appliances, we have also made a much more efficient kitchen.

During the remodeling, the original board wall was discovered behind a newer plaster wall. This wall is now exposed for all to see. The evidence of shelving and whitewash over a red stain finish indicates that this room was originally used as a "buttery." This discovery was confirmed by Prof. Abbott L. Cummings, Yale University, when he visited the Harrison House with his class in April.

I'd like to express many thanks to our Publicity Chairman, Jackie Ulrich for working so effectively with the Branford Review and other publications and to Alice Lambert for the hours spent on her computer turning out our newsletters. Thanks also to Treasurer Bob Sherwood who keeps our financial records in good order, to our Secretary Jean Szeifert for keeping minutes, sending notices and helping with Executive Board correspondence, to our Member-at-Large Michael Sykes for giving us magnificent Christmas parties and to Member-at-Large John Loeb for his contributions from his vast experience, including the Presidency, with the New Haven County Historical Society as well as from his knowledge of local history and of the internal workings of museums and collections.

Without the constant and diligent efforts of all the Board members who have contributed to this newsletter and who regularly keep this Historical Society running smoothly, we would not be here for you today. THANK YOU.

An additional thank you goes to the **BRANFORD GARDEN CLUB** for redesigning the Alta Newton Memorial Garden at Harrison House and to the Men's Division for rebuilding the garden and including crushed oyster shell paths. All new plantings will be added in May. Come enjoy our lovely garden and yard.

The year 1991 was a bountiful one for our museum, archives and photograph collections. The Branford Historical Society deeply appreciates the many fine gifts and loans made by caring members and friends. I would particularly like to thank several persons for major donations of family heirlooms. Norman Plant presented us with a compass and sextant which had belonged to Edmund Palmer II, a well known sea captain in the eighteenth century. The sisters Edith Hills and Florence Klump gave us a handsome framed picture of Aaron Lanfare, born in Branford in 1824, and a Congressional Medal of Honor recipient during the Civil War. The picture was accompanied by the telescope given to him by Queen Victoria of England for bravery during a rescue of English sailors at sea and bears an inscription detailing the rescue. These gifts are an important part of Branford's history and we are proud to be able to show them to future generations of our town.

We are pleased that so many were able to enjoy the MIF display. It was one of our leading industries and touched so many Branford families. This display will be replaced in June by several smaller ones on various themes of local interest.
