Archives On Our Mind...

Most people think of the word archives as those dusty, dull papers lying in cartons in Grandma Abigail's attic and never looked at.

Nothing could be further from the truth regarding the archives of the Branford Historical Society!

Having worked for many years in New York at the Museum of Modern Art Library, in charge of Special Collections, and seen every conceivable type of archive, I can attest that our Historical Society's holdings are anything but dull. They are a joy to behold.

Included in our collection are excellent and unique photographs (some 40 boxes) of Branford people, buildings and scenes over a wide span of history; some 15 boxes of irreplaceable original negatives; plus books, slides, diaries (some from the Civil War), daguerreotypes, extensive genealogies of Branford families, a large section of Connecticut town histories, and

microfilms of local newspapers.

The Archives are well organized and in good condition due to the hard work, foresight and knowledge of our Town Historian Jane Peterson Bouley; Marlene Palmquist, Director of the Blackstone Library, and before them, the late Betty Linsley, who organized and catalogued an enormous amount of material.

We are all excited about the upcoming transfer of our archives from the Harrison House on Main Street to the newly equipped and designated Branford Room in the beautifully renovated James Blackstone Memorial Library.

Once the holdings are in place in the Library, I look forward to working further on them with the advice of Jane and Marlene. Mrs. Mabel Kerrigan has also very kindly volunteered her assistance. As a relative newcomer to Branford, I shall value their opinions and judgment.
