Branford was settled by families from Wethersfield and New Haven. Among them were Richard Harrison, Robert Rose and John Linsley, all of whom have descendants living in Branford today. Home lots for the settlers were provided for by the first land division in 1645 which centered around the corner of today's Main and Montowese Streets. Main Street was part of the Kings Highway that ran from New York City to Boston, and Montowese Street was known as Towne Street. We know little of the early life in Branford, but families survived by farming the rich soil and utilizing the products of the sea. The settlement of "Totoket" grew slowly and life focused around the family and the church. A threat to this focus occurred in 1667 with the Newark migration. (more in our next issue)
