

FOCUS ON BRANFORD By Jane Bouley (continued)

The period of uncertainty in Branford's history following the migration to Newark in 1665 is exemplified by the ministry of the Church. Rev. John Bowers served until 1677 and afterward many visiting ministers came to preach, none of whom were given the Call. Solidification of the Church would finally occur in 1687 when Rev. Samuel Russell became the 5th minister of Branford. During his ministry, an important meeting took place at his home in 1701 to organize Yale College. Russell kept the books for the library and served as a Yale trustee. Rev. Russell died in Branford in 1731 after 43 years of service to the "Congregational" church.

PLAQUES AVAILABLE FOR HISTORIC HOUSES

The Board of the Historical Society has voted to resume selling plaques to residents living in historic or architecturally significant houses in Branford. During the last five years over 1,000 houses were identified by the Branford Architectural Preservation Trust and the National Register of Historic Places. Residents whose houses have been surveyed by the APT and/or included in the National Register are eligible to purchase signs through the Society.
