### FROM THE PRESIDENT:

About a month ago, members preparing for the Harvest Festival noticed that a good deal of shrubbery down past the barn had been cleared, leaving open access to foot traffic from Route 1 through our property to West Main Street, and, in one instance, a car that was blocked in the driveway simply drove through on the far side of the barn to exit through a parking lot to Route 1. So we are now accepting bids to extend the palisade fence either to the far corner of the barn or straight down the property line to where the swamp begins. At the same time we are in correspondence with SPNEA hoping that they may acknowledge responsibillity for boundary lines as a capital expense, which they might assume.

IN SEPTEMBER, DAVE DRIESSENS, affectionately called "Dusty Dave" from his work as archivist at the Congregational Church, gave a program of anecdotal stories of old Branford families. Many of his tales went back to 1644 when the Puritans from Wethersfield established the church in Branford and the churcxh and state were inseparable. One of the interesting stories concerned one Anna Williams, whose tombstone in Center Cemetary lists all three of her husbands. The first two died of tuberculosis, and of the third we can surmise the same fate. Voting in Branford in the early years required not only membership in the Congregational Church, but oath of allegiance to the New Haven Colony, as well as being male and a property owner. Trinity Church was founded in 1784 by dissidents from the original church who wished to return to the Anglican worship. Dave Driessen is a source of knowledge on early Branford history, and a delightful speaker. Thank you, Dave!

ON NOVEMBER 14TH, BILL BARR gave a slide show and talk entitled CONNECTICUT ODDITIES. He has collected interesting historical facts about places and events in the State's history. Bill is active in the West Haven Historical Society and his talk was enjoyed by about 30 members.

After having to postpone the HARVEST FESTIVAL for a week because of heavy rain, we had a beautiful sunny day on October 26th and good attendance.
