WOMEN PILOTS IN WORLD WAR II

Branford resident, Jane Miller, psychotherapist and author, will talk. on the period in her life when she flew planes with the WASP volunteers during WW II from aircraft factories to bases all over the United States and England in order to free up pilots for combat. It was an exciting time when women had an opportunity to match the men in training and performance. Miller test-flew the BT-13, a single engine plane, at a training base in Bainbridge, Georgia. The Womens Air Service Pilot program was attached to the Air Force, but did not receive the recognition they deserved for 33 years after the war.

BENEDICT ARNOLD

The Reverend Dr. Wallace T. Viets is a retired pastor of the First Methodist Church in New Haven, was a teacher at Yale Divinity School, and a Fellow of Timothy Dwight College at Yale. His interest in Benedict Arnold began when he grew up only 25 miles from the site of Arnold's greatest victory, and from residing in New Haven, where Arnold was an influential citizen prior to the Revolution. Trying to understand this complex individual has become a hobby with Dr. Viets, and his lecture will try to convey this without either condoning or condemning this historic figure.

News from the Blackstone Library

Over the past months since the Library returned to 758 Main Street, the Reference staff and I, along with Jane Bouley, have been planning the best layout for the Branford History Room. We have moved the family genealogies and most of the town histories from the high density storage area to the Branford Room; making judgement decisions along the way, unfortunately, slows things down.

The general plan for this room is to include books on Branford history and local authors, genealogies, Connecticut town histories, archival materials, vertical file material that supplements information stored in the Town Hall and Jane's collection of Branford photos. Scrapbooks of carefully collected articles about the Town from the *Branford Review* and *The New Haven Register* will remain stored in the high density but easily accessible area because of their size. The Branford Room, because of the sensitivity of the materials housed there, will be kept locked until the room can be properly monitored.


