# Winter & Spring Programs

#### FEBRUARY 20th: "Special Use Oil Lamps"

Society Museum Chair, **Anton Wohlert**, will lecture on oil lamps from the 1800's. Dr. Wohlert's presentation will concern unique lamps and lanterns which served a number of purposes, and will be accompanied by actual items from his collection, such as a lamp used as an image projector, another that indicated the time, and a combination night light and medicine vaporizer. Please join us and learn more about this topic from one of our Society members.

#### MARCH 20th: "Native Cooking"

Madison's **Dale Carson**, an authority on Native American and Northeast Woodlands cultures, is a Native Cooking columnist, artist, lecturer and gourmet cook. A member of the Abenaki Nation, Mrs. Carson will present a program on Native cooking while discussing the customs and foods common to area Native Americans. Some entertaining story telling in this show-and-tell presentation will surely capture the interest of all attendees.

#### APRIL 24th: "The Amistad"

Jennifer White, Director of Education for the New Haven Colony Historical Society, will offer a most informative program on the Amistad, the infamous slave ship recently cited in a popular book and film detailing its story and history. An exact replica of the Amistad was anchored in New Haven Harbor last summer, offering daily sails on Long Island Sound. Be sure to join us for what promises to be a fascinating lecture.

# MAY 15th: Annual Dinner Meeting "Remembering the Lone Ranger"

Bob Schulz of Woodbridge, voice-over artist and retired radio and TV personality, will provide Society members with a memorable link to the past, reliving the nostalgia of radio entertainment. Mr. Schulz will reminisce about Jack Benny, Fred Allen, Kate Smith, Fibber McGee and Molly and others as he recalls the "good old days of radio." # A Vigilant Watch of Historic Importance

ver a year ago (May 14, 2001), an Ad Hoc Committee (Bill Davis, Arnold Peterson, Paul Rowan and Anton Wohlert) was approved by the Board of Directors to explore the feasibility of purchasing the Harrison House property from the Society for the Preservation of New England Antiquities (SPNEA).

Before obtaining the services of an appraiser experienced in historic structures, it was necessary to obtain a formal Preservation Restriction Agreement from SPNEA to identify the restrictions and conditions that the Society would have to accept. In January 2002, we received this agreement from SPNEA. It should be noted that during this period of time, the Society had been actively involved in establishing a National Historic District that included the Harrison House property, as well as monitoring the proposed condo development (Sterling Ridge, LLC) within the designated area.

After several delays, Mr. Marc Nadeau, SRA of Nadeau, Perrelli Associates, 35 Vineyard Avenue, Guilford, Connecticut 06437 was contacted to appraise the property on Friday, December 13, 2002.

Presently, the Sterling Ridge, LLC proposal is pending. The Connecticut Historical Commission (CHC) has been alerted as to the interest of the developer to *demolish* the Wyllys Russell House and barn, 148-162 Main Street. Mr. John W. Shanahan, CHC Director and State Historic Preservation Officer, has written a letter to the owners of the property and the developer citing the Commission's responsibility under Connecticut General Statute, to prohibit the *unreasonable destruction* of "historic structures."

Please keep a vigilant watch for when the Sterling Ridge, LLC proposal appears on the meeting agenda of the Planning and Zoning Commission, so that your objections to this development can be heard.

#### From the Archives

#### The Iron "Betty" Lamps



The First Pilgrim Lamps made in New England about 1639.



Captain John Carver, first Governor of Plymouth Colony, purchased in Holland just before he sailed, a Dutch iron "Betty" lamp. It was undoubtedly this feeble light which helped to make less gloomy that crowded cabin from which dates so much of our history.

Such small iron lamps were very similar in shape to the old Greek, Roman and Assyrian ones and are precisely the same in principal. The body was usually cast or wrought in one solid piece, with the nose or spout for the wick to lie in one end, and a short, curved upright handle. To this handle was often attached a short linked chain with an iron spindle and hooked end, and a slender iron pick to free the wick when it became crusted with soot or carbon. The spindle was used either to hang up the lamp from the top of the chair, where the reader sat, or to fasten it to position by sticking the sharp end between the stones of the fireplace. Oil was obtained from the swarms of small fish found in great abundance all along the coast. The light was very feeble, however, and the wick constantly crusted over. The odor of the burning fish was anything but agreeable. This lamp, or some variations of it, were soon made and used in America for over 200 years. I am quite certain that the Betty Lamp was used in the Harrison House for a period of time.


